Details: More than 500 people, from agencies large and small, have responded to The Center for Community Solutions survey about how the impact of COVID-19 pandemic and Governor DeWine's stay-at-home order. Early data has shown that nearly all agencies have experienced disruption as a result of COVID-19. Organizations are adapting rapidly, and more than two-thirds are delivering services by phone, video chat services or both. But some worry about the quality of services and the ability of all Ohioans in need to connect using technology. They are also more worried about the mental health and well-being of their clients than themselves.
