

Increase funding to at least \$10 million per SFY for non-Medicaid services for older Ohioans such as meals, transportation, and personal care services so they can remain safe and healthy in their homes and communities. Funding should be provided to the AAAs without carve outs to meet local community needs. (Senior Community Services ALI 490-411)





Increase Medicaid reimbursement rates for PASSPORT home care, Assisted Living, and other services for older Ohioans so they can remain safe and healthy in their homes and communities. Services are not available for everyone who needs them and providers cannot afford to help those most in need. (*ALI 651525 Medicaid Health Care Services*) Area Agencies on Aging have been the champions of promoting and expanding the use of home and communitybased services (such as home care) for over 40 years, saving the state an estimated \$12 billion.



Home Care "Parity Commitment": Older Ohioans should be able grow older in their homes and communities. The state should invest in Medicaid programs supporting older Ohioans equitably (at home, in assisted living, in nursing facilities) so that home is a real option for all older Ohioans.
